DEAR PARENTS

Each year approximately 329 children under the age of 5 die and 785 children under the age of 5 are injured in house fires in the United States. More simply stated, that's almost 1 child per day! A large number of these fires are started from children playing with matches or lighters.

You as a parent or guardian can help make a difference in

these deadly statistics if you keep in mind the following:

- 1. Kids have a "natural" curiosity about fire.
- 2. Kids do not feel threatened by fire. After all, we invite fire into our homes everyday; matches and lighters, fireplaces or woodburning stoves, gas ranges, or candles (birthday, scented, or holiday.)
- 3. Kids have NO CONCEPT of how quickly fire spreads and gets out of control!
- **Your child has recently been through the "Matches and Lighters are Tools Not Toys" Program. Please take a few moments with them to look over this activity book and reinforce it's important message.**



BOOTS would like you to draw an "X" on the grown-up tools!







EVERYDAY FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- 1. Develop and practice your home escape plan.
- 2. Install smoke detectors on every level of your home.
- 3. Test your smoke detectors monthly and change your batteries once a year or as needed.
- 4. Keep all matches and lighters out of the reach of children.
- 5. Teach children not to play with matches or lighters
- 6. Teach children if they find matches or lighters not to touch them but to tell an adult.
